Navajo Sand Painting

Navajo Sandpaintings, also called dry paintings, are called "places where the gods come and go" in the Navajo language. They are used in curing ceremonies in which the gods' help is requested for harvests and healing.

The figures in sand paintings are symbolic representations of a story in Navajo mythology. They depict objects like the sacred mountains where the gods live, or legendary visions, or they illustrate dances or chants performed in rituals.






















Louise Despont























Kazuki Takizawa

As an artist who lives with bipolar disorder, Kazuki Takizawa uses glass as a means to explore his inner reality and destignatize mental illness. In an aim to give the invisible shape, Takizawa crafts elaborate vessels and installations, each with a unique story. Universally rooted in a dialogue around mental health, his series examine broad themes such as attaining minimalism among chaos as well as personal narratives around family, and his individual challenges. Takizawa has travelled to numerous communities in and outside the US to share his work and act as an advocate for mental illness. His practice offers an uncommon and inclusive space to increase awareness and start a conversation.

Takizawa is a Japanese glass artist based in Los Angeles, California. He graduated from the University of Hawaii at Manoa with a BFA in glass art in 2010 and currently owns and runs KT Glassworks.

Jingle Dress Project

Eugene Tapahe, Navajo, is a designer, artist and photographer, who specializes in capturing the beautiful landscape and people of the Southwest.

Fine arts photographer Eugene Tapahe's idea for "Art Heals: The Jingle Dress Project" came to him in a dream. Legend has it the jingle dance originated from an Ojibwe man who dreamt of its healing power during the Spanish Flu. Now, Eugene travels the west photographing his daughters and friends in National Parks and Monuments as a way to reclaim indigenous spaces and bring healing to the world. pbsutah.org/this-is-Utah

Since June 2020, the Jingle Dress Project has toured the country, promoting wellness and healing through dance and photography. So far, they have visited nearly three dozen sites, which has included many national parks and sites once frequented by Native Americans. On July 10, 2021 the group visited Cannon Beach and performed in front of its iconic landmark, Haystack Rock. KLCC's Brian Bull was there to document their visit, as they continue to tour the Pacific Northwest.


















Meredith Monk

Guadalupe Maravilla

Sculptor, performer, and sound healer Guadalupe Maravilla combines his personal experiences as a formerly undocumented immigrant and cancer survivor with ancient and indigenous knowledge to create new rituals for healing. An impressionistic and kaleidoscopic look at Maravilla's multifaceted practice and biography, the film follows the artist as prepares his solo exhibition at Socrates Sculpture Park in Long Island City, New York and conducts healing sound performances for his community. From his Brooklyn studio, Maravilla recounts his personal journey as an unaccompanied minor fleeing the civil war in his native El Salvador and migrating through Central America to the United States. As an adult, Maravilla was diagnosed with colon cancer, which he considers a physical manifestation of the trauma he experienced as a child. During his radiation treatments, Maravilla was introduced to the sound bath, where participants are "bathed" in sound waves meant to encourage therapeutic processes. Struck by the healing potential of sound, Maravilla vowed to learn and share sound healing with other's if he overcame cancer.















Zena El Khalil

Agnes Denes

Agnes Denes is a Hungarian-born American conceptual artist based in New York. She is known for works in a wide range of media—from poetry and philosophical writings to extremely detailed drawings,

The American environmental artist Agnes Denes, who planted a wheat field against the backdrop of New York's Twin Towers in 1982, has chosen Venice as the second location of her site-specific flag installation, "The Future is Fragile, Handle with Care". The installation is a cultural call to action in response to the crisis of human and planetary health.

The site-specific flag installation is fluttering in the breeze in the Venice lagoon, her latest cultural call to action coinciding with the 26th UN Climate Change Conference, Cop26 in Glasgow (until 12 November). The flag, installed by local fishermen last month, is the latest iteration in an environmental project led by Healing Arts, a non-profit founded last year by the Culturunners organisation and the World Health Organisation's Arts & Health Programme.

Shaun Leonardo

Shaun El C. Leonardo is an American artist and performer best known for his work exploring the relationships between masculinity, sports, race, and culture.

How can splintered stereotypes become mechanisms for portraying a fuller self? Summoning experiences from his formative years, performance and socially-engaged artist Shaun Leonardo embarks on bold explorations of the ways that art has allowed him to expose and distort societal perceptions of Brown and Black people, and, in the process, make sense of his identity. Born to Latin American immigrants in Queens, New York, and recruited to play football at a private New England college, Leonardo recounts a seminal moment on the playing field: a beloved coach provokes him to play as if he was "just let out of Rikers." For Leonardo, the incident revealed the hypervisible and dehumanizing ways that Black and Brown bodies are perceived, setting him on a path to seek ways that he might exist more fully and freely in his body.
