Society of Inclusive Blacksmiths

The <u>Society of Inclusive Blacksmiths</u> is an organization working to change the image of blacksmiths in the 21st century by supporting, promoting, and highlighting historically underrepresented populations and forward-thinking work. Through listening to the experiences of others and working to understand their perspective, SIB builds a community that truly supports, encourages, and educates people regardless of constructs of race, gender, sexuality, gender orientation, or physical limitations.

The organization began in 2018 when smiths gathered in August 2018 at the Cascadia Center for Arts and Crafts (CCAC) in Oregon. The goals were a collaborative project for the on-site sculpture garden and conversation around issues of inclusivity in blacksmithing. The event brought women from across the country, ranging in age, experience, and metalworking interests. At the conclusion of their time at the CCAC, the team agreed to continue the project as the Society of Inclusive Blacksmiths (SIB).

Sister Paula Mary Turnbull

Sister Paula Mary Turnbull, the revered Spokane artist and nun who created the Garbage Goat and other iconic sculptures in Spokane and beyond, died at 97.

Sister Paula dedicated the last 80 years of her life to producing art and teaching others. Until her health started to fail, she lived at Spokane's Convent of the Sisters of Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. Her international fame as the "welding nun" resulted in a studio being built exclusively for her more than 25 years ago on the convent's grounds.

Sister Paula was welcoming to visitors to her studio, giving tours and holding classes. She served as a kind of creative ambassador for the other sisters there who devoted their lives to God, once writing that art and art education was her "ministry ... a gift from God to be developed and shared."

Chloe Darke

Chloe Darke is of the generation fueling the DIY movement, hungry to explore and savor the act of *making*, driven to create. Having studied metalsmithing and jewelry at Maine College of Art, she now produces fine sterling place settings for Old Newbury Crafters in Amesbury, Massachusetts, a four hundred year old studio producing hand wrought silver. Darke is a perfect example of an art student who has utilized her education for her livelihood, an accomplishment that relates directly to her talent and determination. Her daily work reinforces and informs her personal work which centers on the female form and aesthetic.

Heather McLarty

As an artist blacksmith I don't feel the pressure of much competition. I use ancient hand forging techniques along with more modern metalworking ones to achieve aesthetic and functional goals in my pieces. It is a very labor intensive occupation. I work almost entirely on commission. My clients are the best! Together with them I design and build works from metal that are site specific. I have designed and made works as small as napkin rings and hair pins to an award wall that is 25' high by 10' tall, gates onto the athletic field at Occidental College, and all sizes in between. From pedestrian gates and railings to garden fountains, silver spoons to pure sculpture. Each piece is different but all have a through-line of taking metal from a hard industrial form and giving it life.

The magic happens by using heat (about 2200 degrees) and hammering on an anvil. It is an exhilarating experience. After studying theater at UCSD I started out as a prop builder for large regional theaters throughout the western states. During that time I learned even more about history of periods and styles in architecture. I learned to work with many different designers and other craftspeople in different shop situations. I learned a lot of creative problem solving on the job using many different materials. Once I transitioned to my own artistic metalworking business I have been able to bring those skills to bear.

Elaine Unzicker

<u>Elaine Unzicker</u>, based in Ojai, transforms chainmail into a sleek and wearable material. Slipping on one of her gloves creates a tactile sensation that is unique and unexpected.

I create seductive, wearable objects combining jewelry techniques with chain mail to caress the female body. As a child, I was taught to be quiet and not express myself even though I noticed creativity flowing through my grandmothers fingers in the form of quilt-making. I find my voice when I create art through the meditative state of linking one ring at a time. When knitted with thin metal wire and small rings this masculine, war-like material becomes extremely soft and flowing. The ritual of laying the transparent veil of chain mail on a woman invokes a sense of security and a feeling of empowerment. My creations are a merging of art and history in the intimate setting of a woman's body.

Lately, I've become fascinated with the color and pattern of chain mail. I was reminded of the quilt squares my grandmother Minnie always had sitting by her chair. These thoughts led to a series of wall pieces relating to a quilt square format. "Legacy" being the first in the series, a pattern created using bright colors similar to hers. Translating the material to a wall format has opened a whole new venue for my art with new directions.

Lisa Geertsen






Monica Coyne

I began as an industrial artist. Experience and skill with metal greatly influences my art. I am trained as a blacksmith to shape steel into tools and connections that will serve an efficient end. I have made a name for myself in the blacksmithing community by forging forms that contradict the weight of the material and the prudential practice of the craft. The strength of steel offers me the opportunity to experiment with balance and asymmetry. Its versatility provides the ability to create surprising forms. I have always been fascinated by the idea that the shape of something can create an emotion in people. I can follow the vein of iron and carbon. I can take it to a place of function, to a gate, a tool, a joint. Or I can follow it where it wants to go. Or I can do both. This is what I am trying to do. Let the metal move. Explore the forms it takes from steel bar to skin, bone and water.


Anne Bujold

Agnes Jones

Agnes Jones is a sculptor based in Glasgow who draws in steel to make linear pieces full of character. Translating pen drawings into steel, her work changes this very solid material into something that looks like it has been sketched in the air. From large public art sculptures to garden and homeware commissions, her work can be seen across the UK.

"I have worked as an art blacksmith for ten years now, and have always been led by drawing. Working with line drawing allows me to create pieces that are full of character, movement and narrative, and allows a structural material to seem like I have quickly sketched it in mid-air. I have been exploring how to use line more sparingly and simply, leaving the viewer to fill in form on their own. The location and area around each piece is important as the work is forced to interact with the shapes, movement and feel of a site."
